Dr. Sydney Leggett Appointed Superintendent of Regional School District 13



At a special meeting on **April 9, 2025**, the RSD 13 Board of Education unanimously appointed Dr. Sydney D. Leggett as Superintendent, effective July 1. A Connecticut native with extensive regional experience, Dr. Leggett is known for her student-centered leadership and commitment to collaboration and academic excellence.

She currently serves as Superintendent in Plainfield and Cornish, NH, and her background supports Region 13's priorities, including the Memorial School project and strengthening community trust.

The Board thanks Dr. Patricia Charles for her service as interim superintendent. A welcome reception for Dr. Leggett is planned this spring.

Honoring Our WWII Hometown Heroes

On **May 19**, two Middlefield residents were honored at the State Capitol for their courageous service during World War II—defending our freedom and democracy with extraordinary sacrifice and unwavering determination.

Charles Arrigoni, a Staff Sergeant in the United States Army Air Forces, served in the 492nd Air Service Operations from December 10, 1945, to January 20, 1947, both in the European Theater and within the United States. He was awarded the World War II Victory Medal for his honorable service.

Raymond Frank Larson, Machinist's Mate Third Class in the United States Navy. He reenlisted and ended up serving honorably from November 21, 1944, to March 8, 1954, aboard the USS *Diachenko*, USS *LCS*, and USS *Botetourt*. For his service, he was awarded the Victory Medal, the American Theatre Medal, and the Asiatic Pacific Medal with One Star.

It is both a solemn duty and a great privilege to recognize the brave individuals among us who wore the uniform during such a defining time in history. In their honor, a proclamation was presented declaring **May 19, 2025**, as **World War II Veterans Appreciation Day!**

Tax Collector

Tax Time Reminder

July is right around the corner, and both the Tax and Assessor's Offices are working hard to ensure your tax bill is delivered accurately, on time, and to the right address.

The address that appears on your bill is provided to the DMV by you and then shared with our offices. The Assessor and I are not allowed to change your mailing address until the bill is returned to my office as undeliverable. We do our best to ensure accuracy, but if you believe you should have received a bill and have not received one, please contact my office or email Tax1@middlefieldct.org.

Reminder – per State Statute 12-130: "Failure to send or receive a bill does not exempt the taxpayer of the requirement to pay the tax or the interest that will accrue."

Also, if you are no longer escrowing your real estate taxes, PLEASE notify the tax office immediately. Banks are just now starting to send their lists. They do not notify the Tax Office when your mortgage is paid off. If you receive a release document without a volume/page number, contact the Town Clerk to ensure it's been properly filed with the town.

Key Dates - 1st installment of your **Real Estate and Personal Property Tax is due on July 1, 2025.**

Motor Vehicle Taxes are due in full on July 1, 2025. You have until **August 1, 2025** before they become delinquent.

How to Pay:

- By mail (check only; include self-addressed stamped envelope if you want a receipt).
- In-person: 393 Jackson Hill Rd.
- Drop box: Cash or check only.
- Online: www.middlefieldct.org (fees apply).
- No credit card payments at the office.

Registering a Vehicle

If you need to register a vehicle and you have delinquent motor vehicle taxes and you need a DMV release you MUST pay in cash or by bank check at the office or in the drop box for an immediate release. Payments made online will not be released until 5 business days after I receive the file which is the day after you make your payment. Checks for payment at the counter or in the mail go to the bank on Thursdays and are then released on the following Thursday.



June is Dog Licensing Month!

Make sure your furry friend is licensed - it's their ticket home if they ever get lost!



Licensing Requirements:

- Puppies must be licensed within 30 days of turning 6 months old.
- Adult dogs must be licensed within 30 days of acquisition.

Rabies vaccination must be current.

If it has expired since last year's license, updated proof from a veterinarian is required. Spay/Neuter documentation must be provided if applicable.

License Fees:

\$19 for an unaltered dog

\$8 for a spayed or neutered dog

A \$1 per month late fee applies for renewals after June 30th

How to Register:

- In person at the Town Clerk's Office
- By mail – include a stamped, self-addressed envelope, payment, and required documents (all will be returned).

Renewals: Dog licenses must be renewed each June. Reminder postcards are mailed at the beginning of the month.

Transfers: Transferring from another CT town? Move to Middlefield and transfer your dog's license for \$0.50

Lost Tags: A replacement can be obtained for \$0.50



Middlefield Public Safety Facility Project Referendum

Explanatory Text

The Middlefield Board of Selectmen and Middlefield Board of Finance each unanimously approved a resolution authorizing an appropriation of \$14,500,000 for the Middlefield Public Safety Facility Project (the “Project”) and the issuance of bonds and notes of the Town in an amount not to exceed \$14,500,000 to finance said appropriation (the “Bond Resolution”). The Town Charter requires that the Bond Resolution, after having been approved by the Boards of Selectmen and Finance, be submitted to the registered voters and property owners of the Town at referendum. A copy of the Bond Resolution in its entirety is on file and available for public inspection at the Town Clerk’s office during business hours.

Schedule of Referendum

The referendum is scheduled to be held on **Tuesday, June 10, 2025** in the Middlefield Community Center from **6 am to 8 pm**. A **Yes vote** will approve the Bond Resolution and authorize the expenditure of monies for, and the financing of, the Project. A **No vote** will oppose the Bond Resolution and reject the expenditure of monies for, and the financing of, the Project. The Project consists of design, renovation, repairs, reconstruction, improvements and/or remediation work associated with the conversion of the current Middlefield Volunteer Fire Station located at 406 Jackson Hill Road to a new Middlefield Public Safety Facility.

Description of the Project

The Project includes the following elements:

- Design and construction of an approximately 14,300 square foot addition to the Fire Station.
- The addition will include the construction of five (5) new apparatus bays.
- The renovation and expansion of the existing apparatus bays and the existing Fire Station building.
- The construction of an emergency management office, a resident state trooper’s office, a fire marshal’s office and other public safety staff and administrative offices.
- The construction of an emergency operations center with coordinated communication, Information technology and dispatch capability.
- The construction of fire fighter decontamination facilities and the installation of showers and locker rooms.
- The construction of conference rooms and public meeting rooms.
- The repair and renovation of existing rooms and space.
- Future sleeping quarters, bathrooms, a kitchen, storage space and other rooms and support areas.
- Structural upgrades to building to satisfy storm and seismic activity standards.
- Elevator installation and ADA code compliance upgrades
- Road, parking and grounds improvements, landscaping and other on-site improvements
- Elevator installation and ADA code compliance upgrades

What is the estimated cost to taxpayer of the Project?

The Town of Middlefield has thus far received \$2.25 million in grants for the Project and has applied for additional grant funding that will allow completion of the Project without having to finance the entire \$14.5 million cost of the Project. The chart to the right shows the estimated tax impact to the median home in Middlefield utilizing 2 different bond amortization schedules: 20-year term and 30-year term.

The term of the bonds has not yet been determined. The Board of Selectmen and the Board of Finance will work closely with the Town's financial advisor prior to selecting the duration of the bond amortization schedule.

Unlike a home mortgage where the monthly P&I payment is constant, in the two projected bond maturity schedules presented to the right, there is a relatively constant annual principal payment and the total interest paid for the year will be less the following year. For a 20-yr bond, 5% of the debt (1/20th) is retired each year. For the 30-yr bond, 3.3% of the debt (1/30th) is retired each year.

After the annual increased cost peaks in 2028, reflecting the first full year of debt repayment, the annual debt service due on the bonds declines every year after that.

For the 30-yr schedule, the median homeowner in Middlefield is estimated to pay \$202 (\$16.85/month) the first year, \$252 (\$21.00/month) the second year, and reducing each year thereafter until paying \$107 (\$8.92/month) the final year of 2057. This results in an average payment of \$180 per year (\$15.00/month.)

A taxpayer can use the average per \$100k of market value to estimate one's cost. If one estimates its property is worth \$300k, the estimated tax for the 20-yr schedule would be $3 \times \$118 = \354 per year/average (\$29.50/ month.) The estimated tax for the 30-yr schedule would be $3 \times \$63 = \189 per year (\$15.75/month.)

Property Inspections Happening NOW!

The Town of Middlefield Assessor's Office has begun working on the October 1, 2026, Revaluation of Real Property. Under Connecticut General Statute 12-62, towns are required to implement a revaluation of all Real Property once every five years. Towns are required to "fully inspect" all Real Property once every ten years. The 2026 Revaluation is a "full inspection" revaluation.

The town has hired Lawrence LaBarbera to perform property inspections and data collection for all Real Property located in Middlefield and Rockfall. Larry will be collecting interior data, measuring and listing all residential, commercial and industrial structures within the town.



Larry will have a town issued ID badge and carry a letter of authorization from the Assessor's Office. **He drives a Dark Grey Hyundai with Massachusetts license plates 4ELS 84.** Please extend him your courtesies as he conducts his appraisals.

Renters Rebate Program

A person renting an apartment or a room in a dwelling may be eligible for a partial rebate of rent and utility (heat and electric) bills. The rebate amount is based on a graduated income scale. An applicant's eligibility is based on the following criteria:

1. The renter and/or their spouse is at least 65 years old as of the December 31st preceding the filing period OR is at least 50 years old and the widow or widower of a previously approved applicant, OR is totally disabled and has a Social Security Award Letter or an SSA-1099 with Medicare premiums,
2. OR has proof of benefits under a program which contains requirements comparable to those of the Social Security Administration.
3. The applicant may have rented elsewhere in Connecticut for all or some portion of the year preceding the year of filing, but must file in the town in which they reside during the filing period.
4. Income limits are determined annually by the State of Connecticut. "Income" is defined as income derived from all sources, including tax exempt interest and Social Security. For the 2025 application period, 2024 income from all sources is considered. The income limits for the 2025 application period are \$55,100 for married applicants and \$45,200 for single applicants (the same as for the Homeowners Program). The income limits are adjusted annually if there is a cost-of-living increase to Social Security.

Applications must be filed in the Middlefield Assessor's Office between **April 1st and September 30th**. Applicants must provide the following:

- Proof of Rent and utilities paid during the preceding calendar year and;
- An original or copy of their federal income tax return (if filed) and;
- An original or a copy of their Social Security SSA-1099.
- If federal income taxes are not filed, statements of all income sources (pensions, interest income, dividends, etc.) must be provided. Applications for the Renters Rebate Program must be filed annually.

The Public Works Department has been busy with several projects over the past couple of months. The first major spring project was the installation of 175 feet of new drainage and underdrains on Miller Road near Pond Meadow.

Company - Turnout Gear Grant Award

We're proud to announce the arrival of 21 brand-new sets of turnout gear, made possible primarily through funding from a FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG). This critical upgrade significantly improves both firefighter safety and on-scene performance.



A major advancement in this new gear is that it is PFAS-free. PFAS, commonly known as "forever chemicals," have traditionally been used in turnout gear for their water and stain resistance. However, growing research has linked PFAS exposure to increased cancer risks among firefighters. By switching to PFAS-free gear, we're making an essential investment in the long-term health of our members and reducing their exposure to one of the most pressing health risks in the fire service today.

You'll also notice a new look - we've transitioned from tan to a traditional black outer shell. Backed by research and field testing, this change improves visibility and contrast in various environments, helping our firefighters remain visible to one another and to drivers on scene.

The Middlefield Volunteer Fire Company remains committed to advancing firefighter health, safety, and effectiveness through continued innovation, research, and grant-supported investments.

Mark your calendar!



The next Referendum is scheduled for **Tuesday, June 10**, from 6 am to 8 pm.

Voters will decide on the proposed Public Safety Complex.

Middlefield introduced its new voting tabulator during the May Referendum. Connecticut was the 46th state to upgrade from its outdated ballot-counting system to a modern, secure solution.

These new tabulators are already in use in about 35 other states and have proven reliable and efficient. Like our former system, they are not internet-connected, cannot be tampered with, and are considered secure against fraud.

The improved technology includes a touchscreen that assists voters by flagging any issues with the ballot—such as when the required oval is not properly filled in. As always, the oval must be filled in completely, but the process remains simple. Tabulator Tenders will be present to help while ensuring voter privacy is respected.

At upcoming Referendums and Elections, an Election Official will be available to demonstrate the new tabulator to any voter who wants assistance. Voters who feel confident with the system may bypass the demonstration and go directly to vote.

Beseck Lake Environment Committee

As boating and fishing season returns to Beseck Lake, the Environment Committee is hard at work launching our 2025 water quality monitoring program.

In early May, All Habitat, our lake management team, conducted the first round of water/algae testing of the Lake. Results from the laboratory analysis are expected soon. These tests measure critical indicators of lake health, including total phosphorus levels, total nitrogen, dissolved oxygen, pH, and other tests which provide insight into the health of our lake.

Importantly, the water tests also include samples for cyanobacteria, also known as blue-green algae. Under certain conditions, these algae can produce visible blooms on the surface of the water. SOME species of cyanobacteria/algae produce toxins that can pose risks to both humans and animals.

From May through September, All Habitat will continue regular sampling and analysis of water quality and cyanobacteria levels to ensure our lake remains safe and healthy.

The Environment Committee is also working with EutroPHIX, a specialist in large lake restoration and a partner of All Habitat. Sediment samples from the lakebed have been sent to SePRO Laboratories for testing. These tests will help determine existing phosphorus levels in the lakebed - possibly a legacy of past septic systems before sewer installation.

Results are expected in mid-July, at which time EutroPHIX will collaborate with the Environment Committee to explore potential lake restoration strategies.

Coming up in June, we will also conduct our annual aquatic plant survey. The survey will map the native aquatic plants in the lake, as well as identify any unwanted aquatic invasive plants.

Finally, we kindly remind all lake users - whether at the town beach or boat launch—to clean up after themselves.

Help us keep glass, plastic, Styrofoam, and other trash from getting into the lake waters!

The Beseck Lake Sewer District has recently experienced a rise in grinder pump repairs and failures - many of which are caused by cooking oil being poured down household drains. These blockages not only disrupt your home's sewer service but also increase maintenance costs for the entire community.

To help prevent these issues, **please do not pour cooking oil down the drain.** When oil cools, it hardens and can clog your pipes as well as the sewer system's tanks and pumps. Instead, let the oil cool, place it in a sealed container, and dispose of it with your regular household trash. Your help in keeping our system running smoothly is greatly appreciated.

A Small Town America Celebration



On July 4, 1776, the Second Continental Congress formally accepted the Declaration of Independence, a document written by Thomas Jefferson declaring the thirteen American colonies independent from Great Britain.

Although the vote for independence had taken place on July 2nd, the 4th is celebrated as the day the declaration was officially announced and adopted.

AMERICA 250 CONNECTICUT

America 250 is a nationwide celebration recognizing the 250th anniversary of our nation's founding - a time to reflect on our history, honor the diverse voices that shaped it, and inspire future generations to uphold the ideals of freedom, democracy, and unity.

As part of the **America 250** initiative, on **April 18, 2025**, the **Middlefield Historical Society** recognized the famous Midnight Ride of Paul Revere. Although no horse was involved, we had a couple of "Paul Revere's" around town. One was stationed at the Old North Burying Ground where a costumed Marc D'Orvilliers stood with his lantern greeting travelers on Jackson Hill Road. The second location was the Community Center Green where Laura Zajac stood patriotically with a flag and lantern. The lanterns were left in place at each location for the remainder of April, but positive feedback was such that we decided to leave the lanterns in place for the summer months as a reminder of the historical moment.

"One if by Land, Two if by Sea"



On April 16, 1775, Paul Revere began to gather tips that a raid was planned on the city of Concord, Massachusetts. With this information, Revere began making plans to alert the surrounding countryside by horseback as the redcoats would be arriving to take their military supplies.

There were two possible routes the British soldiers would travel. The first was by land traveling through the Boston Neck and second was by sea. The plan was to alert everyone with a light signal, those being lanterns. The final place for the signal was the Old North Church in Boston's North End. At that time, it was the tallest building in Boston.

Even today the steeple is visible from far away.



John Lyman School Visits the Middlefield Historical Society

On **May 15, 16, and 19**, the second graders of John Lyman Elementary School enjoyed a field trip to the Middlefield Historical Society (MHS). The event included a one-hour guided, interactive tour of the museum where students learned about life in Middlefield during the 1800's, including manufacturing, farming, and the building of industries.

Classroom activities included creating a map identifying the four (4) original schools built in Middlefield and Rockfall, and designing a quilt by using an example of the many cherished quilts donated to the MHS. The students learned about daily life and school life in the 1800's. Smaller items were provided to children to examine, feel and guess its purpose. A favorite among many was a doll house replica of the original Otis Smith home on Main Street, Rockfall.

Educator, Carole Sibiskie arranged for the tour provided by MHS volunteers. First Selectman Bob Yamartino was there each day to greet the students and staff, offering his words of community spirit while encouraging students to learn about the history of Middlefield.

This first field trip to the MHS in many years provided a hands-on learning experience blended with classroom projects and lots of time to ask questions. A good time was had by all!

AMERICA 250 CONNECTICUT

On **April 19, 2025**, as part of the **America 250** Service Project, members of the **Middlefield Historical Society** planted 74 daffodils at the Old North Burying Grounds - one for each of the 74 children laid to rest there.

The cemetery's last burial took place around 1864. The children ranged in age from just a few minutes old to fifteen years, with most being infants or toddlers.

During that time, illnesses such as tuberculosis (then known as consumption) and pneumonia claimed many young lives, as modern medicine and antibiotics were not yet available.

The daffodil, a symbol of rebirth and hope, was chosen for its ability to return and multiply each spring - offering a gentle tribute to the lives lost. In addition to the daffodils, volunteers cleaned the cemetery sign and planted other spring flowers to brighten the space.



The MHS is open **every 3rd Saturday of the month from 11 am to 2 pm**. Extended **summer hours** will include a **Thursday 3pm to 6 pm opening beginning in June and throughout the summer**.



Community Connections: Middlefield Human Library

What is a Human Library?

The Human Library is an innovative concept that originated in Denmark in 2000, where "books" are actual people with unique stories and experiences to share. The concept is beautifully simple: readers "check out" human books for private individual one-on-one conversations, creating a safe space for dialogue that challenges stereotypes and prejudices through respectful conversation.

This event is organized by the Human Library Committee of Middlefield, and we're thrilled to announce that we will be hosting its first Human Library event in town. It is officially sanctioned by the original Danish Human Library Organization and funded through the "Common Ground Grant." Our goal is to build understanding and strengthen community bonds through authentic human connection.

Become a "Book" in Our Human Library
